A LETTER FROM THE CEO

Rooted in Unity



In 2017, FIVE18 (then Patrick Henry Family Services) planted a seed – a God-sized seed that scared me. Seeds start small, but carry the blueprint for something far greater. We were stepping into a mission far bigger than ourselves, fully trusting God to make the impossible possible.

On July 3, 2017, we asked, “What if every child in our community were safe in their own home?” We knew the answer required more than a seed, it required walking in step with God’s plan and a community willing to grow together. God planted the idea that children belong in families. They need to be nurtured and supported well. We are tending an old, God-given seed – seeking to bring Him glory as it grows.

We began to nurture that seed, building partnerships and learning how to prevent children from entering foster care. Every child in foster care has endured hard things at home that landed them there. Our mission is to prevent this by surrounding families with a faithful care network that will not let them fail.

In 2026, we are uniting and nurturing a care network already present in our community. We’ve trained staff to partner with organizations and churches, creating pathways to help. Collaboration is the water that nourishes our Vision30 seed, making support easy to reach and enduring.

In 2025, we purchased soil for our seed to sprout: a building to serve a growing care network. Spaces for connection and collaboration, places to gather around

hard needs. This is where roots deepen, intertwine, and grow strong for children and families.

This November, we will host our first Rooted Together conference, featuring author Peter Greer. Nonprofits, churches, and community members will come together to celebrate shared purpose and grow in unity to mend children’s futures.

Since God planted the vision in 2017, our seed has grown. Last year, we served 4,200 children. Our donors made it possible without FIVE18 needing to rely on the aid of government funding. Yet more children are waiting for a network to hold them safely in their families. Your continued support will water this seed, helping families heal and prevent foster care.

GROWING ACCESS, GROWING HOPE

When trauma goes unaddressed, its effects can ripple through families and communities for generations. In Altavista and the surrounding Campbell County area, God is at work through a new partnership that is changing that story. FIVE18 Family Services now offers counseling services at the Altavista YMCA, bringing accessible, Christ-centered care to a community that previously had no outpatient counseling options.

This expansion was rooted in prayer, vision, and faithful service. Jennifer Farney, a nurse and humanitarian advocate,

recognized the urgent need for trauma-informed outpatient care. With 30 years of experience serving vulnerable populations, Jennifer had witnessed firsthand the lasting effects of family dysfunction, abuse, addiction, domestic violence, and exploitation. Guided by a heart to serve God through care, she secured funding, partnerships, and space to make counseling accessible to families in need.

Jennifer's collaboration with Faith Towles, Community Engagement Administrator at FIVE18, grew out of years of shared ministry, educating communities on exploitation and



fostering safe, resilient environments. In January 2024, their vision came into focus: to expand FIVE18 services across Altavista, Campbell County, and Pittsylvania County, connecting with partners who shared their calling.

Pastor Josh Crews of New Prospect Heights Baptist Church in Hurt became an early advocate, saying, “There is a great need for these services today. As a society, we

must tear down the negative stereotypes surrounding mental health.” His faith-led support, along with the guidance of Maria McCracken, CEO of the Altavista YMCA, helped make the vision tangible, opening the door for FIVE18 counseling at the YMCA.

The impact has been profound. Within a year, the Altavista office grew from three days per week to six, serving 27 patients and offering a bi-weekly grief support group to bring God’s hope and comfort into the community.

The Altavista FIVE18 counseling office stands as a quiet testament to what happens when God’s people listen, collaborate, and act. Together, they are bringing hope, healing, and resilience to families, reflecting the love of Christ and reminding the community that no one must walk through trauma alone.

GOD'S HANDS IN THE COMMUNITY

At FIVE18, we believe God calls us to be His hands and feet, supporting one another so that children are safe and families thrive. When our Community Collaboration team received a call to stand alongside other nonprofits to help struggling families, the answer was simple: a wholehearted “yes,” trusting that God would guide our steps.

The request came after a Department of Social Services (DSS) supervisor shared with Terry Wecker of Isaiah117 House the challenge social workers face in connecting families with the resources they need. Though resources exist, navigating them while carrying the weight of complex cases can feel overwhelming, like searching for a single thread in a tangled web.

Recognizing the need for prayerful collaboration, Wecker invited FIVE18 to lean in on the monthly Vision30 Gathering, the region’s most collaborative space, to lift and brainstorm ways to help an anonymous family in crisis.

In the room ideas, knowledge, and connections flowed freely. Hands went up, voices shared wisdom, and one idea sparked another. Notes were captured and sent to DSS, each one a small act of service and faith in action.

Bringing these conversations into The Gathering reminds us that God works through people. Each thread of effort, each act of compassion, is part of a larger tapestry of His love, weaving families and communities together in strength and hope.



Wecker reflected, “I pray that by helping at-risk families access the resources they need, we are following God’s heart for families to be kept together and strengthened.”

Through this process, attendees were reminded that God has placed remarkable people in every corner of the

DADS, COMMUNITY, AND

Christmas Magic

This Christmas, God's love was reflected in a powerful collaboration between local nonprofits and hundreds of community members, creating a moment where fathers were truly seen, celebrated, and encouraged. Beyond gifts or recognition, the event revealed the quiet power of a community united to strengthen what God places at the heart of every neighborhood: family.

As plans for Father Christmas 2025 began, FIVE18 staff prayed for guidance, knowing that the event's success depended on the community coming together in faith and generosity. Nominations were requested for dads who embody God's love through care, commitment, and provision. From dozens



of heartfelt nominations, eight fathers were chosen. Each received \$500 at the December 16 event, along with gifts for their families, thoughtfully selected to bring joy under their holiday trees.

One dad, Joe, shared how he had struggled with temptation and depression, feeling unable to provide for his family. The event became a moment of God's affirmation, a visible reminder that his perseverance and love mattered. Tears of gratitude flowed as he and other dads were encouraged, supported, and celebrated. By night's end, fathers left renewed, reminded that when they lead with love and faith, their lives ripple outward, nurturing children, families, and the broader community.

FIVE18 believes that supporting one father can create a wave of impact. Engaged, present, and spiritually grounded dads help children flourish academically, emotionally, and spiritually. When families feel stable and cared for, God's peace extends into schools, neighborhoods, and the wider community.

"Every community benefits when men are encouraged to love, protect, teach, and lead their children in God's ways," said Dave Frett, Director of FIVE18 Dare2Dad. Reflecting on the event, he added, "Because of God's guidance and the unity of our community, fatherhood received an extra shine this Christmas season."

THE WEEK EVERYTHING CHANGED

Sometimes the greatest healing
begins with a simple truth:
someone stayed.

When Landon arrived at Hat Creek Camp, he carried more than a backpack. Years of loss and instability weighed on him. He had moved between family members, spent time in foster homes that didn't last, and been separated from his sister. Most recently, he had been placed in a group home where care was constant but often impersonal, leaving him wary of adults and unsure whom he could trust.

To make matters harder, a broken arm kept him from many of the activities he had looked forward to at camp. Quiet and withdrawn, Landon kept to himself while the other campers laughed and played.

But at Hat Creek Camp, counselors

understand that every child carries a story. Rooted in Christ's love, they meet children where they are, with patience, compassion, and a willingness to walk beside them at their own pace.

Throughout the first days of camp, staff gently encouraged Landon, inviting him into quiet activities and simple conversations. At first, it seemed no one could reach him. Still, the team remained present, believing every child is seen and valued by God.

One afternoon, feeling overwhelmed, Landon wandered away from the group. Two staff members stayed close, speaking calmly and reminding him their presence was meant to keep him safe. Later that evening, Landon

shared something that had frightened him deeply. For nearly two hours, the program coordinator, nurse, counselor, and a trauma-experienced volunteer sat with him, helping him slow his thoughts and steady his heart. It was a quiet moment of care that reflected Christ's love through patient presence.

The next day, something had changed. Landon laughed, played kickball, and joined the other campers. “I think he finally realized that we really do care about him,” one staff member shared.

By the end of the week, Landon was already talking about returning to camp someday to help other kids like him.

Stories like Landon's are possible because of your generosity. Through Hat Creek Camp, God is using your support to create spaces where children experience safety, compassion, and the hope that healing is possible.

When *God* Brings Partners *Together*

For years, Blue Ridge Pregnancy Center and FIVE18 have quietly grown a meaningful partnership, guided by a shared faith in God's call to care for families. This relationship hasn't been shaped by a single program, but by a mutual desire to walk alongside families with compassion, dignity, and practical support, reflecting God's heart for the vulnerable.

The partnership first took root during FIVE18's Homes of Hope program. During that season, Blue Ridge Pregnancy Center partnered closely with FIVE18 staff, offering encouragement, resources, and spiritual support to mothers. When the program concluded, the relationship did not end; instead, it continued to grow in new ways as God revealed evolving needs.

Over time, FIVE18 staff have been blessed to serve Blue Ridge Pregnancy Center through hands-on acts of love, packing resource bags for mothers completing classes, and sharing encouragement in tangible ways. Referrals between both organizations remain steady, ensuring families receive not only practical support during pregnancy but also ongoing wraparound care as their families grow.

Blue Ridge Pregnancy Center has also graciously opened its doors to FIVE18 for evidence-based training opportunities,

including Circle of Security Parenting courses. These gatherings became spaces for shared learning, fellowship, and growth, where God's guidance shapes both staff and the families they serve. The partnership has expanded to include fatherhood engagement through FIVE18's Dare2Dad program, bringing hope and mentoring to fathers connected to their work.



At its heart, this partnership reflects the spirit of Vision30, organizations intentionally serving one another in the name of Christ for the good of local families. Pamela Mulligan, a leader at Blue Ridge Pregnancy Center and longtime Vision30 partner, now serves on the Vision30 Gathering Planning Committee, embodying the trust, care, and relationships that have grown over time. Together, these organizations offer a glimpse of what happens when God's people move beyond coordination to faithful, relationship-centered service.

The PLACE HE PREPARED

Have you ever had a moment when you clearly experienced the voice of God?

The search for a new headquarters for FIVE18 Family Services began long before I was ever employed here. It started as a dream, one held by Robert Day, our former CEO, of a permanent home that could truly serve both our mission and our community.

Within my first few months working at what was then Patrick Henry Family Services, I remember having a casual conversation with coworkers. Half-joking, half-dreaming, we said, "Wouldn't it be amazing if the old Phase 2 building ever became available and we could buy it?" At the time, it felt like nothing more than wishful thinking.

About six months before we identified our future headquarters, I was invited to join a team tasked with searching for a new location. I toured multiple properties alongside our leadership team. Each option fell short in some way: environmental issues, too much space, too high a price. No matter how promising they looked on paper, none of them felt right.

Then one evening, driving home from church, I experienced a moment I will never forget.

As I passed the former Phase 2 building, its parking lot empty, the building sitting vacant since 2019, I heard a thought that was unmistakably not my own: "I wonder if that building is for sale."

I immediately brushed it off. Surely not. I knew the building had been purchased years earlier, and there had been hope that it might reopen as a music venue. Still, the thought lingered. When I got home, I opened my laptop and searched for the property.

To my astonishment, the building had been listed for sale less than a week earlier.

At that moment, I knew. Deep in my spirit, I knew this would be the new headquarters for FIVE18 Family Services.

That same evening, in June of 2024, I emailed Robert Day and Jeff Nitz with the property listing. A few weeks later, in early July, we toured the building together. Standing inside those walls,

I felt complete peace. We were going to take ownership of it.

What followed was a long and thoughtful process. We returned to the property multiple times with staff and board members. We held working sessions to dream about what the building could become and how it might serve as a true community collaboration center. The Board met repeatedly, voting on key decisions and faithfully discerning each next step.

On December 18, 2024, all the pieces came together, and FIVE18 Family Services officially took ownership of the former Phase 2 Night Club.

Throughout 2025, we focused on clearing out the building and working closely with Dominion Seven Architects on layout and design. We held an auction to sell many of the items left behind and began preparing the space for its next chapter. On September 2, the Board convened to select a general contractor, ultimately awarding the project to Coleman-Adams.

In a beautiful full-circle moment, Coleman-Adams had originally constructed the building in 1993, when it first opened as Cattle Annie's under A.C. "Buzzy" Coleman. They also led the 2010 renovation when the building became Phase 2. Now, decades later, they are bringing the space to life once again, this time as the future home of FIVE18 Family Services.

Today, we are in the midst of renovations and anticipate completion in late summer or early fall. Soon after, FIVE18 staff will move into the building, and we will begin welcoming others into the space as well. Our dream is to create a community empowerment center. A place that is open, welcoming, and actively serving the public.

The building will include Mission House Coffee, open seven days a week. There will be four conference rooms on the main floor, a 4,000-square-foot event space available for reservation, and 19 counseling offices, each one representing the hope of lives being supported and transformed. We especially hope our Vision30 Partners will make full use of the space, while also opening the doors to community partners who share our heart for service.

What began as a quiet nudge from the Lord has become a powerful testimony of His faithfulness, and we are deeply grateful to walk this journey alongside you.

Tell us a little bit about yourself.

I'm originally from Richmond, Virginia. I moved to Lynchburg in 2001 to attend Liberty University for undergrad and law school, graduating in 2008. After a two-year clerkship with Judge Petty on the Virginia Court of Appeals, I worked at a local firm for about seven years. In 2017, I opened my own practice with my wife, Kelly, who's also an attorney. We've been married since 2008 and have four kids ranging from eight to fifteen. Our firm handles personal injury, workers' compensation, long-term disability, and medical malpractice cases.

How did you first get involved with FIVE18?

I got involved as an attorney when Robert Day, the CEO at the time, needed legal support for drafting legislation that allowed children to be placed temporarily with trusted family or church members without transferring custody, which became one of my most memorable projects. That work opened my eyes to FIVE18's mission of supporting families and keeping kids in their homes whenever possible.

How did you get involved with the board?

I joined the board in 2014, not long after working with FIVE18 as an attorney. What drew me in was their forward-thinking approach, always asking how to do things better for kids and families rather than following the way things have always been done. That vision is exactly why I've stayed involved.

What accomplishments are you most proud of?

I'm most proud of the board's decision to move away from the orphanage-style, campus-based model in Brookneal. That was a courageous shift that positioned FIVE18 to care for families more effectively. I'm also proud of the name change, a clear commitment to being a faith-based family services organization rooted in Scripture. Finally, the decision to sell properties and reinvest in a new operations center reflects bold, dynamic leadership.

What about FIVE18 resonates with your personal values?

FIVE18's commitment to preserving the organic family whenever possible resonates deeply with me. When reunification isn't possible, they're equally committed to finding permanent solutions so no child ages out of care without a sense of belonging.

What makes FIVE18 unique in the family services space?

Everyone involved is genuinely committed to the mission, without ego, personal agendas, or power struggles. There's a willingness to do whatever is necessary for the good of children and families in our community. I also think that because we don't rely on government funding, we have the ability to say no to sources of funding with requirements that wouldn't necessarily lead to the best possible outcomes for the kids. FIVE18 is uniquely positioned because of God's provision and the foundational partnership of our donors to make decisions based on what's best for kids rather than financial pressure. That combined with a strong, faith-driven team enables FIVE18 to make a real difference in people's lives.

Tell us a little bit about yourself.

I grew up in Charlotte County as a preacher's kid at a small rural Baptist church. I attended James Madison University, then returned home to marry my high school sweetheart, Jim. We have a cattle farm in Campbell County. I began my career as a special education teacher, earned my master's at the University of Lynchburg, and got my doctorate from VCU. I eventually became superintendent in Appomattox County in 2018, and I retired from that job in June 2025.

How did you first come across FIVE18?

Through my church, which had a longstanding relationship with what was then Patrick Henry (now FIVE18) Family Services. Right before COVID, former CEO Robert Day spoke at our church, and his story gave me a much deeper understanding of the organization's mission to serve children who have experienced trauma. That resonated strongly because in my role, I saw those same needs daily—students who required structure, support, and healthy relationships. After COVID, mental health needs increased significantly, especially for students without Medicaid or access to counseling resources.

What was the impact of partnering with FIVE18 in Appomattox County schools?

Absolutely transformative! FIVE18 allowed us to reach students who otherwise had no access to mental health services. They consistently wrapped around students and provided care regardless of funding barriers—demonstrating a deep commitment to serving kids first. There was never a denial of services due to lack of funding, which built tremendous trust. FIVE18's counselors connected authentically with our students and problem-solved alongside us, helping us figure things out while respecting school boundaries.



How did you come to serve on the FIVE18 board?

I was approached because of my familiarity with FIVE18's counseling services and their community impact. I was motivated by a desire to see that level of support expanded across Central Virginia. Appomattox has a unique partnership with FIVE18, and I see that as a model to replicate in other communities. My practical perspective from daily experience with student challenges allows me to continue advocating for children even into retirement.

What about FIVE18's mission resonates with your personal values?

I've always viewed education as a calling and a way to serve Christ. FIVE18 reflects that same commitment—serving with intention, compassion, and purpose through thoughtful, wraparound approaches. Despite negative narratives about youth and public education, there is goodness in our world. FIVE18 recognizes potential in families and offers both practical support and genuine hope. That's deeply meaningful.

Tell us a little bit about yourself.

After learning about FIVE18's short-term respite care and its focus on supporting families before a crisis occurs, I knew I wanted to be involved. Helping launch that work in our community became my entry point into FIVE18 and its broader mission.

Why do you choose to partner with FIVE18 financially?

The mission deeply resonated with my wife and me, particularly the idea of giving parents temporary relief by caring for their children. While hosting children wasn't the right fit for our family at that season of life, the heart behind the program strengthened our commitment to support it financially. Giving became a meaningful way to be part of that impact. I believe FIVE18 will take whatever amount I give and multiply it ten times over. I wish I could give more.

A Steward of Hope

How does FIVE18's mission resonate with you personally?

What resonates most is the focus on helping families before challenges escalate into crises. The commitment to keeping families together benefits not just parents and children, but entire communities. Hearing former CEO Robert Day articulate a clear, hopeful vision strengthened my belief in the work – work that strongly aligns with my own values.

What do you think is one critical need in our community?

Stronger support for fathers. Too often, dads are physically present but lack the emotional support or encouragement needed to fully engage as husbands and fathers. When fathers are actively involved, families are healthier, and children are more secure. Addressing this gap is essential to restoring families and ensuring children grow up in safe, stable homes.

How do you want to see the community transformed?

A community where no child is left without a loving, permanent home. Eliminating the idea of "orphans" feels unattainable, but with God, nothing is impossible. With a goal like that, you'll change the world.

What excites you most about FIVE18's future?

The way FIVE18 is bringing its efforts together under one roof to share resources and expand outreach. The new facility will only strengthen that work. My hope is that fewer children will need crisis-level intervention.



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Walking Alongside Hope

My name is Bryan Moss. I've been married for 25 years, I'm the father of nine children, a foster parent, and I've served as a pastor for the past 14 years. Today, I serve as the Therapeutic Services Coordinator at Hat Creek Camp. Before joining FIVE18 Family Services, I spent years working in the behavioral health field—but long before any title, I could see God weaving together a calling on my life.

Growing up, I often felt like I didn't quite belong anywhere. Still, I found myself sitting beside others, listening as they trusted me with their stories. Somewhere along the way, I realized helping people is what I was meant to do. I began learning, training, and growing, drawing wisdom from others in the behavioral health field so I could walk alongside people with both compassion and skill.

Since I've walked through hardship myself, I'm sometimes able to advocate more clearly for children from hard places, naming needs and feelings that might otherwise go unspoken. When I share where I've come from and the path that led me here, it often brings comfort and hope, especially to children who feel unseen or alone.

My path to FIVE18 grew out of a long-standing relationship with my supervisor, Dan West. After

years of working together, he invited me to help start a mentoring program, which eventually led me to join the FIVE18 team.

The call to work with people both professionally and in ministry has been woven throughout my life for as long as I can remember.

Now, no two days look the same. Some days I'm walking the grounds of Hat Creek Camp, listening to children at play while holding space for both their hurts and their joys. Other days, I'm sitting across the table from a child who needs guidance, supporting mentors, leading community trainings, or strengthening partnerships across the region.

Through it all, I remain grounded in my faith. I believe in God's Word and the power of prayer, everything I do is rooted in His grace. This isn't just a career for me. It's a calling. And every child I meet reminds me that healing begins when someone is willing to walk alongside them.

Called to Stay

At Hat Creek Camp, a ministry of FIVE18 Family Services, welcomes hundreds of children each summer. It is a place where children are gently encouraged to grow in resilience, grounded in the love of Christ.

Last summer, our staff theme was unity – learning to work together as the body of Christ so every camper is seen, known, heard, and loved.

That spirit of unity is reflected in many ways through our volunteers and especially through one dedicated volunteer, who happens to be my husband, Ian Rosario. Ian works full-time at a drone company and also coaches the LU Snowboarding Team. Still, out of love for his wife and a willingness to serve where he felt called, he committed his summer to Hat Creek Camp.

Even before camp began, Ian gathered 15 members of the LU Snowboarding Team and organized them to prepare the campgrounds and decorate. His work set the tone – creating spaces that were thoughtfully prepared and ready to welcome children with warmth and excitement.

Once camp began, each morning, Ian left camp at 6 a.m. to drive an hour and a half to work. Then, around 6 p.m., he returned to camp life—helping with dinner, lifeguarding evening swims, building fires on cool summer evenings, and teaching campers to fish at the river.

God placed Ian alongside a 16-year-old camper carrying deep pain. With a broken arm and the weight of trauma from witnessing abuse in his family, this young man didn't need quick solutions. He needed someone willing to listen and stay. Ian offered just that by spending time with him and offering compassion, Christlike love and a safe, listening presence.

Throughout this time at Hat Creek Camp, God began stirring something new in Ian's heart. By September, we opened our home and hearts to our first foster child.

Through faithful volunteers like Ian, God reminded us that unity often grows through small, everyday acts of obedience. God uses our simple “yeses” to bring hope in meaningful ways.
